

NOTES ON CONTRIBUTORS

**WILL BAILEY-WATSON** is associate professor in history education at the University of Reading, where he leads the history initial teacher education programme.

**PIERRE BOTCHERBY** completed his PhD in history at the University of Warwick in 2021, where he works as a teaching fellow in French studies. He is co-director of the Warwick Oral History Network.

**KEITH GILDART** is professor of labour and social history at the University of Wolverhampton. His recent books include *Images of England through Popular Music: Class, Youth, and Rock 'n' Roll 1955-1976* (2013) and *Keeping the Faith: A History of Northern Soul* (2020).

**ROBERT GILDEA** is professor emeritus of modern history at the University of Oxford. His oral history work began with *Marianne in Chains: In Search of the German Occupation of France, 1940-1945* (2002) and continued, co-editing with James Mark and Annette Warring *Europe's 1968: Voices of Revolt* (2013).

**JOANNA GILMORE** is a senior lecturer in law at the University of York where she researches public order law. Her book, *Legal Solidarity and the Miners' Strike: An Oral History*, will be published in 2025.

**IAIN HUTCHISON** was awarded his PhD by the University of Strathclyde. He is a fellow of the Royal Historical Society and a research affiliate in economic and social history at the University of Glasgow.

**GRACE MILLAR** is a labour historian. Her PhD was on families during the 1951 New Zealand waterfront dispute. She is an honorary research fellow at the University of Wolverhampton, on the 'On Behalf of the People' project.

**ANDREW PERCHARD** is an honorary research professor at Te Whare Wānanga o Ōtākou – University of Otago. His books include *Aluminiumville: Government, Global Business and the Scottish Highlands* (2012) and *The Deindustrialized World: Industrial Ruin in Postindustrial Places* (2017).
